Judge Rosenstein's biographical material as printed in the U.S. Congressional Record is very extensive, ranging from his education in his birthplace Frankfort KY thru receiving his Doctor of Jurisprudence from the University of Cincinnati and noting that he was admitted to practice in several courts, served in the Air Corps Technical Training Command during WWII, is a member of several associations and societies, served as a member of the faculty of the Jefferson School of Law Louisville KY, was nominated by President Lyndon Johnson as a Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court and took the oath of office July 25th 1968. He retired from regular active service Jan. 1, 1971 but still has an office address here in the Federal Bldg.

The interest in and importance of her exposition were demonstrated by the numerous questions and comments which followed from the audience.

Our Treasurer Harry L. Young Jr submitted his report for the period ending June 30, 1985 and it shows a very small routine change from the previous month.

Chaplain and Past President Wilbur E. Casey has been Historian of our Ft. Lauderdale Chapter for several months. However, thru oversights while preparing the Newsletter since his acceptance, I have failed to include the announcement in the Newsletter. Sorry. Historian Casey succeeds our former Historian, Thomas E. Davis who gave many years of faithful and efficient service but who, because of illness, asked to be relieved of these duties.

The Ft. Lauderdale Chapter has not participated in the national Douglas G. High Oration Contest for a few years. Its purposes include bringing American History to the high school students and relating the past to the present with focus on the events of today. It is a contest designed to explore an incident in American History of the Revolutionary War that might be mirrored in the life of America today. To enlist the cooperation of the schools and students, the program should be ready at the time school starts in the fall so that the contest can be included in the program for the school year.
